Error Complex verb group Subordinate clause

General Description

Error (15 times)

Subject-verb agreement: 4 times (that hoodies and T-shirt *is*; you *is* a teacher; some clothes *is* more neatly or *seems* a teacher)

Inappropriate tense: 3 times (after we *washing*; we can *found*; may *told* me)

Singular/ plural noun form: 2 times (*T-shirt* or hoodies; hoodies and *T-shirt*)

Missing relative pronoun: 2 times (wear some clothes ^is more neatly; clothes for ... ^more expensive)

Missing verb: 1 time (clothes for ... ^more expensive)

Redundant pronoun: 2 times

Redundant article: 1 time

Complex verb group

Noun clause: 6 times

Adverbial clause: 5 times

Appropriacy of the words used

General Description

Less common words: no less common word is identified.

Paraphrase: 1 paraphrase is coded.

I'm a teacher → I need to go to work

Idiomatic expressions: no idiomatic expression is identified.

Collocations: no collocation is identified.

Appropriacy of the words used: 8 inappropriate uses of words are coded.

Inappropriate word form: 3 times (very *tired* for me; look like *not neatly*; more *neatly*)

Inappropriate word choice: 2 times (*so that* I think that; is very cheap ^that)

Meaning unclear: 2 times (seems a teacher; ask me to ... or look like a girl)

Redundant preposition: 1 time

E: Now I'm going to give you a topic and I'd like you to talk about it for one to two minutes. Before you talk, you'll have one minute to think about what you're going to say and you can make some notes if you wish. You understand?

S: Yes.

E: I'd like you to talk about the type of clothing you like to wear. *(After one-minute preparation)* All right. Now remember, you've got one to two minutes for this so don't worry if I stop you, I'll tell you when the time is up. Can you start speaking now, please?

S: Okay. I love wearing the ... the type of clothing **that I would like to wear** is something very
